



The Teen Mental Health Crisis

(The observations and statistics in this article document the developments I have perceived over the past 4-5 years in working with teens. There has been an unprecedented increase in depression, anxiety, self-loathing, self-harm, eating disorders, suicidal ideation, sexual acting out and confusion, not to mention alcohol and drug abuse – especially among girls. It is indeed a crisis. – Fr. Paul)

**Teen mental health
has never been this bad.**

As New York Times journalists Michael Barbaro and Matt Richtel discussed on The Daily podcast, we're facing an unprecedented crisis in teen mental health. Mere decades ago, the major threats to the health and well-being of young people in the West were nearly all external, such as illness, car accidents, risky sexual behavior, alcohol, or smoking.

Today, the greatest threats to the health and well-being of young people are internal. As Richtel reported, in 2019, 13% of all adolescents reported having a major depressive episode, a 60% increase from 2007. Teen suicide rates, which had been stable for nearly a decade prior to 2007, "leapt nearly 60% by 2018." In 2019, the American Academy of Pediatrics announced, "Mental health disorders have surpassed physical conditions as the most common reasons children have impairments and limitations." (And all of these statistics were drawn before the COVID lockdowns – FP)

The factors behind this tsunami of depression, anxiety, and self-harm are many, one of which is the internet. In 2017, Dr. Jean Twenge of San Diego State

University noted that the spike in adolescent mental health problems reached a crescendo in 2012. That year, the percentage of Americans who owned smartphones surpassed 50%. Exposing developing brains to an overwhelming amount of social information, she argued, was contributing to a massive, unprecedented uptick in mental health issues.

On one hand, social media has brought the near-constant experience of social comparison to the developing minds of 8, 9, and 10-year-olds. On the other hand, the sheer amount of panicked, hyperbolized, and truly frightening headlines a student must navigate is unprecedented in human history. We might forgive students who are convinced the world is completely out of control.

Richtel and Barbaro also noted other factors in the podcast. For example, the average age for the onset of puberty has become earlier and earlier since the 1980s, especially for girls. Experts are unsure as to exactly why this is the case, but there are plenty of correlations having to do with early exposure to sexually explicit material, fatherlessness, and family breakdown. Whatever the cause, the impact is real.

In the face of this exploding mental health crisis among young people, the demand for care is outpacing the number of trained counselors and psychologists. Pediatricians and emergency rooms have become first responders. As Richtel observed, "Every night, in emergency rooms across the country, there are at least 1,000 young people spending the night waiting in a room to get to the next level of care where they can be helped."

In every generation, followers of Christ have seen protecting and caring for vulnerable children as

Metropolitan Anthony of Sourozh identified three steps in the ladder of advancement to spiritual mentorship. He also cautioned the inexperienced clergy against taking on roles for which they were not prepared spiritually.

He placed newly ordained parish priests on the first step of his ladder. Their ordination qualifies them to perform the sacrament of confession and give absolution of sins. They are not expected to act as spiritual guides or offer advice during confessions.

Priests with some experience of spiritual and parish life and familiarity with their parishioners' spiritual and daily lives are on the second step. They are able to give guidance to their flock from their knowledge and personal experience. When they cannot answer a question, they should acknowledge their ignorance. They should pray that God will reveal to them the right answer and advise the parishioner to do the same.

On the third step of the ladder are the elders. They have become like unto Christ with their lives, and have a calling to lead their flock to the Kingdom of God. They can look into the heart of the person who comes to them and enlighten them on some aspects of God's plan for them. But no one can claim to be an elder arbitrarily. Elders reveal themselves to the world when the Grace of God touches their souls, and they respond to this calling by taking on the feat of mentorship and spiritual guidance.

Genuine elders are very rare. There are many more who claim to be elders inappropriately.

Therefore, Orthodox people would be well advised not to limit their search for a spiritual mentor exclusively among elders. It is possible to find an appropriate guide among the clergy whom Anthony of Sourozh assigned to the second step of his famous ladder. The challenge is to find a mentor that suits our individual needs and circumstances and build a productive spiritual relationship that leads us to salvation.

All spiritual mentors should have Christ and His apostles as their models. Only then can they build their relationship with their disciples on love, compassion, and forgiveness of their sins, just as Christ redeemed the sins of all humanity on the Cross.

In the words of Saint Ignatius (Bryanchaninov), "we are only instruments of the Divine Providence. We are nothing by ourselves; without God's help, we cannot give guidance to anyone, not even to ourselves. So every spiritual mentor must lead people to Christ, not to himself." Unless the relationship between the mentor and disciple is grounded in Christ, it will bring ruin to both souls.

a crucial part of their calling. Today, children are vulnerable to radically changing social conditions, harmful ideas about their minds and bodies, the loss of institutions crucial to their health and well-being, and a barrage of bad news.

The first step in fulfilling our calling is, in the words of Dr. Matthew Sleeth, to Hope Always. Children need the truth about life and the world, about themselves and God, and we can give it to them. Of course, parents must limit and help guide children in their digital interactions, as nearly all experts recognize. But this is not merely a crisis of media: It's a crisis of meaninglessness. That's one reason a Harvard psychologist writing in *Scientific American* argued that "Psychiatry needs to get right with God."

Christians have an obligation to care. When we see the brokenness of the world around us, we are to imitate the work of Christ. In His name, we can be a force for good in our lifetimes, and, God willing, reverse the tide.

This group meets once a month on a Thursday evening during the school year for fellowship and to foster spiritual growth. They discuss texts related to Orthodox Spirituality.

This group meets bi-weekly on Thursday afternoons to study Holy Scripture. Its purpose is to provide a bible study opportunity for women who are unable to attend evening events and classes.
