Welcome to St. George:

Three "Generations" of Converts

St. George Cathedral owes its existence (by the grace of God) to Orthodox immigrants from Lebanon who made Wichita their new home. Theirs is a culture that we continue to celebrate in many ways.

Today, the vast majority of parishioners are no longer foreignborn—and at least half are not Lebanese/Syrian by heritage. Since 1948 many of our clergy have been drawn from the ranks of converts. Several parish ministries, such as the Treehouse and Christ the Savior Academy, owe their existence to the efforts of converts.

Each convert has a story to tell about the "road to Antioch" and what St. George means to him or her. Here are the stories of just three who happen to be connected in a very special way.

1947 — Anthony Gythiel

A Scholar's Scholar

Anthony Gythiel was born in West Flanders in 1930, the fourth of seven children. Their mother died during a Nazi bombing raid when he was nine. Tony was educated by Jesuits and became a Roman Catholic priest. He served as a missionary in Zaire, a former Belgian colony, until revolution there forced him to flee for his life.

After settling in Detroit he left the priesthood and pursued a PhD in medieval history. He married Dana Jorns, a Lutheran inner-city schoolteacher, and started a new life as a college instructor. Blessed with an incredible intellect and mastery of 13 languages, Dr. Gythiel would become one of the most respected professors at Wichita State University, winning Pentennial Gelebration WSU's highest faculty award.



One of Dr. Gythiel's students, Warren Farha, introduced him to Orthodoxy in the late 1970s. Tony converted in 1981, and thereafter on Sundays could usually be found in a back pew not far from the icon of St. Raphael, a fellow immigrant to America. Dana sang in the choir.

After becoming Orthodox, Tony devoted much of his spare time to translating important Church texts. To date, 16 of his books have been published. Six years before his death, Tony was honored at a unique ceremony held at St. George, as St. Vladimir's Seminary granted him an honorary doctorate.

On the Air

In 1986, Dr. Gythiel sponsored another St. George convert, Rod Learned, who had married Valerie Laham four years earlier. "This is a good day," wrote Gythiel on the day of Rod's chrismation, "a blessed day."

With his enormous red afro and made-for-radio voice (Rod worked at both KFDI and KKRD - FM 107), Learned couldn't help but stand out a bit. "No one ever assumed I was Lebanese," he joked, "but everyone, beginning with my loving in-laws, went overboard to make sure I felt welcome."

As years went by, Rod moved from the pews to the choir, gave tours during the Big Dinner, and was elected to the continued page 3





In 2008 Rod served as sponsor and godfather to Trent (Deacon David) and Jennifer Sebits and their children. Dn. David was raised Lutheran and his wife, a former news anchor for KSN, as an evangelical.



Soon af-

ter the couple's marriage in 1998, Bishop Basil began a dialogue with a group of Lutheran ministers interested in Orthodoxy. Although he wasn't a pastor, Trent joined in the discussions and became convinced that Orthodoxy was where he and his family needed to be

At the urging of Bishop Basil, Trent enrolled in the St. Stephen's Course—an intensive, three-year program designed to prepare men for the diaconate. He was ordained on March 20, 2013, and has faithfully served the Cathedral as deacon ever since.

A distinguished scholar from Belgium, a deejay whose English ancestors came to America in 1630, and the grandson of a Danish farming family— these are just three of the Orthodox converts who call St. George Cathedral "home." Their lifelong commitment to holy Orthodoxy has enriched the tapestry of our congregation in ways no one could have imagined.

KENYA MISSION TRIP

PART 2 OF 2 BYMATTHEW ASH

On Monday morning we drove to Makarios Children's Home, where two years before Sandy served and loved the children there. They were excited to see her familiar face and to greet our new faces. We were welcomed with song and dance from the children as we gathered inside St. Nicodemus Orthodox Church there on the grounds of the



school. From there we split off into smaller groups with most of us going to classrooms with the teachers and students to teach them Bible lessons in the morning that correspond to Holy Week lessons in the afternoon. Jennifer Thomas and Chad Bumsted were part of the construction team helping to build the new classroom right next to the church, so they went off to begin their labor of love.

This continued for Monday and Tuesday because the Bishop wanted us to go to a different school in Meru on Wednesday. It was only two days spent with the children at Makarios in Nyeri and already relationships were forming. We were asked by many of the children and teachers if we would be coming back to spend time with them. We reassured them we would be back on Thursday to spend time together. The children, many of them orphans, and most in tattered, dirty clothing, would take us by the hands and walk with us. These children who have already had such difficult and unimaginable struggles, who have no material possessions and only the barest of necessities, were full of joy, questions, and love for us. One 6th grade boy said, "You have no problems in America" and we explained to him that while we do have a lot of material things, food, clothing, and possessions, we have problems too. I told him that part of the problem we have in America is that we have all of these "things" that we try to fill our lives with because we struggle to find meaning, purpose, and joy - but all we do is fill our lives with "things" so we have a lot of anxiety and depression. I told him that in Kenya where there aren't that many "things", you have joy, faith, and hope and that you talk about God like He was here with you and that we in America often forget that fact. The day ended

with embraces, pictures, and "see you Thursday" shouts from many of us and many of them.

Over the course of the next few days we would spend time at Makarios Children's Home/School in Nyeri, St. Mark School in Meru, and St. John School (orphanage) in Gwa Kung'u. Wherever we went, we were greeted and welcomed like family. One thing became clear: Orthodoxy was alive and well in Kenya and the Kenyan people truly had the hospitality and love of Christ. During our daily reflection time after dinner each night, we would take turns sharing our thoughts on the day and the Bishop would listen intently. It had become quite apparent that our Lord knew what He was doing in each of our hearts when He stirred us to follow Him and His Great Commission and be sent to Kenya.

The final days in Kenya were spent on Sunday at a Hierarchical Divine Liturgy at St. John Cathedral, which was a marathon Liturgy that concluded with hours of dancing, celebrating, singing, and the papadias (priest's wives) gifting of our missionaries with colorful shawls in African patterns. On Monday morning we all went to back to Makarios Children's Home where we gathered with the children, teachers, Fr. Gregory, and Bishop Neofitos inside of St. Nicodemus Orthodox Church. The children presented their beautiful song and dance performances for us, which were accompanied

a Farewell Letter

Twenty years ago, I sat in my car with Father Paul outside the Cathedral after lunch, listening to Father tell me, "Jon, at some point, you're going to have to stop reading and start coming to services." I had been doing exactly the thing against which St. Gregory Palamas fought in the 14th century—believing that I could come to know God simply by exercising my mind.

For me, the Church (and, frankly, God Himself) was just an intellectual proposition. With patience and time, you changed all that for me— (a) because you embraced me and my Roman Catholic family with everything you had, (b) because you taught me that the Church isn't another doctrine to be believed but something to be lived and experienced and to transform one's very being, and (c) because you helped me learn that the Church is messy and without any option to check out-it's a family in which there are squabbles, differences, and sometimes, even, blatantly wrong things going on but also a family in which we forgive each other, love each other, and walk alongside each other as we make our way to the Chalice each Sunday and, ultimately, to the Kingdom. You helped me discover that knowing God is about building relationship with Him—directly, as in prayer, but most often indirectly, by coming to know and love each other—and you modeled this for me.



As we leave the Cathedral for Denver at the end of September due to my job requirements, we do so with hearts that are heavy—heavy with the sadness and tears that come with departure but also heavy with gratitude for all that you have given to us, which we'll take from here to there in our hearts. You—the Church—have changed our lives for the

better for all of eternity. All we can say is "thank you" from the bottom of our hearts.

As the years slip by into the future, please remember us—in your private prayers and, from time to time, at the altar—and we will do the same. by ancient, rhythmic drumming and clapping. Their faces beamed with pride and gratitude and they even pulled the Bishop out of his cathedra to join them in a little dance. I should mention that earlier in the week a little girl mentioned to us that she wanted cake. So, for a few days we put our heads together with Sophia to see if we could make that a reality for all the children. Following the performances, we handed out small cake muffins to all of the children and teachers as we left the church!

Now the time had come for us to say our goodbyes – we had grown so close to the kids, teachers, staff, and clergy. We had experienced so many moving, beautiful moments where we witnessed and felt God's love for all of us. We had experienced a few struggles (a couple of us wound up in the hospital while others on our team dealt with some sickness and internal struggles) where we experienced the mystical grace and comfort of God as well, and we learned that these momentary trials we experienced while on the Lord's mission were just small martyrdoms, and we took comfort in Him. We worshipped, prayed, broke bread, communed, laughed, cried, taught, learned,

hoped with our Kenyan brothers and sisters. It was hard for us to get back in the church van to leave. Our final moments there were filled with strong hugs from the kids...a lot of "I love you's" back and forth, and words of love and encouragement from us to them, and from Bishop Neofitos to our team.

Reflecting on our time as missionaries in Kenya, we are still energized and strengthened in our faith to have witnessed the beauty that is the Orthodox Church in Kenya. The Orthodox Church is the body of Christ in this world. Knowing that when we celebrate the Divine Liturgy at St. George here in Wichita we are joined in communion with our Lord, the Saints, and our Kenyan brethren and all Orthodox the world over...that was made very real by our time in Kenya. We went to teach, serve, and love and what we discovered is that we were taught, served, and loved. Let us continue pray for the faithful and the people of Kenya and for the Diocese of Nyeri and Mt. Kenya, just as assuredly as they continue to pray for their St. George family. Glory to God for all things!







I was given a great opportunity to go on Wichita's most recent YES trip. We helped with the Treehouse's Labor Run and passed out positive notes inside a Walmart. People's facing gleamed with joy as we handed them cards. 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


